

Side-by-side comparison of the Current SAT and the New Digital SAT

*Marking a question as opposed to merely skipping it can help one stay organized. For example, a 'mark' may be used to indicate a skipped question a student feels they *may* be able to tackle later, while a non-marked question may indicate a skipped question that felt very inaccessible to the student.

**Adaptive scoring means that section 1 (of either reading/writing or of math) determines a broad assessment and Section 2 'fine tunes' according to this scheme:

- Answering fewer than 50% of Section 1 questions correctly will initiate an *easier* Section 2 that allows a final score in the range of approximately 200 to 570.
- Answering more than 50% of Section 1 questions correctly will initiate a *harder* Section 2 that allows a final score in the range of approximately 450 to 800.
